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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, based on what I was told that Senator Vrtiska is trying to do, I cannot agree to his amendment. There are two parts to the amendment that was adopted this morning. One inserted the word "or" where it needs to be...or struck the word "or". It's there and it needs to be stricken. That should stay in, that...that part of the amendment. This other is an activity which has been done by executive order. It can continue to be done that way. What I think we ought to do is just remove that...that entire package from the bill. I've told Senator Hilgert and I will say it to Senator Vrtiska, because I hadn't mentioned it to him, I will work to craft a bill for next session that will do just what everybody says we want to do, but the federal government does not require this part to be enacted. It does not have to be enacted at all. An attempt was try...was undertaken to try to give the Legislature some oversight with reference to the program. What I would do, and Senator Hilgert has agreed that he would work with...along this line too, I'm sure Senator Vrtiska would get into the loop, contact whatever department of the federal government this program is under; find out if the state intends to enact legislation of this kind how such a bill needs to be fashioned in order to comport with the federal requirements. Does the federal law require that there be a senatorial presence? Some people say yes, but that would violate the Nebraska law so you couldn't have that anyway. If taking the senators off will bring them so far out of compliance with the federal law that it's as though no law were enacted anyway, what we ought to do is leave everything right where it is. The program can continue pursuant to a Governor's executive order. We would not disturb anything. We would not put a bill of any kind into law that may be ineffectual. So what I would suggest is that we...either Senator Vrtiska be prevailed on to withdraw his amendment, if one is up there, or we defeat his. Then Senator Hilgert had told me that what he intends to do is to offer an amendment that would strike just that part of the program that we were talking about earlier where the difficulty came in because of the presence of state senators. If I have confused anybody who is interested, I'm willing to answer any questions. Now that I have gone through something like an explanation, I'm going to recapitulate as clearly as I can. The amendment that was adopted this morning has two parts. One of
