no way of advising you how much those breaks might cost. But in previous discussion I think we had just a little bit of a hint of what they might look like. Senator Baker told us about the need for people in the petroleum retailing industry to install new tanks. Those tanks were installed subject to sales tax. Those tanks were installed because of a federal mandate. Those were typically small businesses, probably less able to absorb the cost of the sales tax in that instance than the broadcasters that you're being asked to benefit today. Because, remember, all those petroleum retailers aren't as rich as Senator Baker, sorry, Senator Baker, or Sapp Brothers or other folks. A lot of those are just your friends and neighbors in your hometown. They had a tough time with that federal mandate. Others will be in the same situation. How can we stop? Where would we stop? And how much would it cost? This bill, if it passes, will create a very difficult and potentially expensive precedent for us. The other issue that you need to consider this morning, and I haven't raised this issue on other bills, so I hope that Senator Kristensen doesn't think it's unfair to raise it on this bill, this bill, according to the current fiscal note, and you can look on your sheet, costs about \$900,000, \$850,000 I think, I'm sorry, over the next three years. That's \$850,000 we don't have. If you look at the sheet, you'll see that if we do everything that everybody wants, everything that has an A bill attached to it, and that we might pass, that we're over...I think the number is over \$50 million down in the fourth year out, \$51.5 million to be precise. Now, maybe it's a small step to say that we're not going to give \$850,000 to the broadcasters, that is admittedly a small step toward remedying that deficit in that future year. Other steps will have to be taken, I'm confident of that. We've heard that the Governor is going to propose other steps to address that deficit, if you will. We will be confronted with tough choices, once the Governor has made his decisions. But I can't imagine why, at this time, we would want to make those decisions even harder for us by giving away \$850,000 to the broadcasters. It just makes those other decisions a lot harder, those other decisions about how we're going to use scarce resources to provide services or other governmental functions to the citizens of the state of Nebraska. And aren't those more important to us than a break for a bunch of broadcasters? I'll leave...Mr. President, I'll leave the motion up for a little while, if people want to talk.
