SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wickersham, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR COORDSEN: In someplace in the recess of an old man's memory is a definition of immediate family that's perhaps in Chapter 21, that paraphrase...I'm going to paraphrase because I don't remember it probably exactly, but it says something to the effect that immediate family means anyone to whom one is related to by blood or marriage. Now, if we took that and we decided we wanted to limit that, and we added, out of the...some other sections of statute "to the third degree of consanguinity",...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Um-hum.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...wouldn't that achieve our purposes, without trying to develop a list that, just by making the list, becomes exclusively a list?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes, except...with one exception. That would not include stepchildren.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Wouldn't a person be related to stepchildren by marriage, or am I missing something?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: I don't think so, but...

SENATOR COORDSEN: Well, I'll be darned. I thought when one remarried that one, by marriage, was related to one's stepchildren. But not having been afforded that luxury, I guess, I have no comment on it. But I think that we could probably come up with something that's better than current statute but not be creating a list for us to be finding exceptions to. Thank you.
