I'm hoping that my colleagues will listen enough to what is going on here to realize that the Department of Motor Vehicles, which sold this bill on the basis of being able to create these digital images which can be used in helping a person facilitate the obtaining of a duplicate driver's license or whatever that other one was, you don't have to come down there or whatever the other one was, they can do all that without biometric identifiers. How likely is it that somebody else in the world is going to say, hey, I saw a picture of a guy in America and he...I look like him? And this...this fellow is in Kenya.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: He says, I'm going to get on a airplane, I'm going to fly to America, go to the Department of Motor Vehicles and say, I'm Ernie Chambers, so he can get a driver's license and he doesn't even have a car and doesn't even live in this country. How likely is it that somebody is going to look so much like you that they need a mathematical construct to determine the difference between you and that person? Who is even going to take that time? That is so far-fetched, not that Senator Bromm mentioned something that can be done is far-fetched. I'm saying the suggestion that that needs to be done, when all we're talking about is a driver's license, it is so far-fetched as to be preposterous. When those are the kind of arguments that have to be made to justify something like this, there is no justification. Thank you, Mr. President.
