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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then I'm going to ask you what does the word "proximate" mean?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Well, actually, the word "proximate" has been in conjunction with minor in possession statutes; has been addressed by the Nebraska Supreme Court on a couple of different occasions to determine why...when a minor is actually in possession of alcohol or not, and so there are some Supreme Court cases on the issue of whether a minor is actually in possession or not. And just generally speaking, a minor, in order to be convicted of minor in possession, has to have conscious knowledge and actual possession of that alcohol, and that's generally the way that the court cases go.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Quandahl, I'm going to ask my question again and, if it's not clear, I wish you would let me know which part is not clear. What does the word "proximate" mean in this bill?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I guess I'm not...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What is a police officer supposed to determine that the word means because the police officer is the one who's going to apply it? Based on our creating of a legislative history here, what is the police officer to take this word to mean?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: The police officer would...I guess I'm unsure...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: ...of what a police officer would take the word to mean, but...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That (inaudible).

SENATOR QUANDAHL: ...there is...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm not...I only got one minute, so I won't have you go on. And the next time I get a chance to speak I
