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let me throw in a couple or two cents here. Rather than simply penalizing these children, perhaps, in ways of the Class III misdemeanor and the license revocation, perhaps we should try to fashion a response that addresses the problem at hand. For example, if you're a young person, you're associating with alcohol, there's reason to believe that you have been drinking, perhaps there should be a different response. Those individuals that I described, those young people are commonly referred to in some places as at risk children. So perhaps the response would be for the state of Nebraska to determine just what the risk is. In other words, if an individual, if a young person is caught in this situation, perhaps a drug abuse, alcohol and drug abuse assessment should be done. Maybe that would be an opportunity for the state of Nebraska, people in the state of Nebraska to use this as an opportunity to intervene in that young person's life to determine if they, in fact, have a drinking problem or a problem with other drugs. Maybe that is the response that we can put into law. We're still sending the message of our concern, we're still sending the message saying, we shouldn't be doing this; but we're also sending the messages that you're young and that the state of Nebraska wants to help you, if you have a problem. Shouldn't our first response perhaps be, is there a problem in your life that's putting you in this situation? Do you have a chemical dependency problem? Should that not be addressed? If you have a chemical dependency problem and you're a young person in Nebraska, you're not going to achieve sobriety by having your driver's license taken away. Maybe that will lead us elsewhere if we do something like that. Maybe it would lead us to the revelation that our services for our young people in the state of Nebraska are wanting. We're going to be listening in Appropriations to some testimony this week that are saying that we need mental health and substance abuse services for our young people if you're in the judicial system. So fine. The state of Nebraska is willing to help you as long as you commit a crime first. What about those young people who aren't committing crimes? What about those young people who haven't been caught, who haven't been convicted? Aren't their lives worth salvaging as well? Perhaps Senator Quandahl has given us a vehicle to have, as a community,...
