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SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, that disrupts my whole conversation in this process because I'm not going to sit here and talk to myself and nobody else wants to listen. So I suspect I'll probably turn my time back to the Chair and wait till Senator Quandahl comes down and then maybe I can...can have...engage in some conversation with him in regard to this bill and...and...and perhaps the future of this bill. And so, with that, I'll turn the rest of my time back to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Engel, on the reconsideration motion.

SENATOR ENGEL: Mr. Chairman, members of the body, as far as the bill is concerned, I believe this...with the amendments coming up from Senator Quandahl as far as getting rid of the presumption, I think it's going to be a good bill, and then one more thing. I heard from someone here on the floor this morning that they had heart surgery several years ago and that took care of 20 percent of their mental capacity, and Senator Kruse said alcohol can take care of the other 50 percent of their capacity so they feel better about themselves only having 30 percent of their capacity. But at this point in time I'd like to turn my...the rest of my time over to Senator Chambers, because I believe this is going to go on (inaudible). Senator Chambers, if you'd like to have my time, you...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...you have about four and a half minutes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Thank you, Senator Engel. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I don't see Senator Quandahl but I was going to give him another free lecture and lesson so his lawyering will be more thorough next time. Let me tell you all why I keep going after Senator Quandahl. He brought this bad bill. He is a lawyer. It is inexcusable in a lawyer. Where much is known, much is required.
