ASSISTANT CLERK: Senator Chambers would move to amend with AM1105. (Legislative Journal pages 1155-1156.)

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to open.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, and before anybody becomes alarmed, that won't happen because nobody's paying attention, but my having made that statement causes everybody to look up and live. This is an amendment I've discussed with Senator Quandahl. We had made a substitution in his original bill of some more neutral language for specific language relative to churches, wine, and such things as that in these religious ceremonies. What this amendment does is to track that language in his bill and put it in a section of the statute already existing which lays out exemptions. The statute that I'm amending contains language that speaks of a church and wine, so all this does is to harmonize the language in that existing statute with the language that Senator Quandahl has put in his amendment that is now the bill. If you have any questions, I'm prepared to answer them.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Quandahl, on the Chambers amendment to LB 114.

SENATOR QUANDAH: Thank you, Mr. President. And, members of the body, have discussed it; have looked at it; it is consistent with the bill and I do concur with it, so...
