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Nebraska. If you look at the categories in significant General Fund increases that we've had in our budget, \$60 million is what we're looking for. Well, we've had a \$94 million, \$95 million of increase in aid to local governments. Well, that's property tax relief. Shall we not do this but take the \$60 million elsewhere; for example, the juvenile evaluations, the county reimbursements, the aid to the ESUs, the mass transit aid? That's property tax relief, and we're doing that to the tune of \$95 million. Okay, that's off the...we don't want to go there. How about...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR HILGERT: ...\$60 million out of aid to individuals? Well, that's only \$66 million that we've had a significant increases in this budget. Do we cut out the aid to the aging? We have to cut out almost all of that that we've done because we're only spending 66. We're looking for 60. Well, where else do we go? How about our state agencies? Well, we've had significant increases to the tune of \$85 million; \$60 million out of 85? Where is the place that we can cut? I would love to be able to cut \$60 million and find a place to cut the total of \$60 million without turning the back on the basic obligations we have as state senators in Nebraska. If someone has an idea, come forward. That's too big of a number. But anyway, property taxes will go down. We're going to stay on track. We're going to go from \$1.10 to \$1.00.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.

SENATOR HILGERT: That was on the table at one time during the interim. People were thinking about turning their back on that commitment.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator, you're out of time but you are the next light. You may continue if you'd like.

SENATOR HILGERT: Okay, this is my light that is on now?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Yes.
