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And I'm not sure that the \$5.7 million, or whatever it is, in this part of the budget is going to...5.4? Thank you, Senator Suttle...is going to save LB 305. But...I mean, LB 305, we're talking about close to \$50 million. But I don't like the idea that this is what we can do for teachers this year, because I don't think this does anything for teachers. It does something for future teachers. It doesn't do anything for teachers that are already in the classroom. And that concerns me greatly. Senator Chambers, you know, the Titanic doesn't have to sink if it has the right captain and the right crew members and they see that iceberg up ahead. It would be possible to save the Titanic. Maybe there's another way around that iceberg. Maybe we don't have to use sales tax. Maybe we could do it another way. But I would certainly like to save any kind of money we can. And I wouldn't be...I mean, I'm actually favorable to this program, and would like to continue to support it, but not with the attitude that this is what we're going to do for teachers this year, because it doesn't do anything. Somebody told me recently...and I don't...I haven't verified this, I don't know if it's true or not...but that California is looking for 80,000 teachers next year. Eighty thousand teachers? Could that be? That's more than four times the number of teachers, or approximately...I think Nebraska has about 22,000 teachers, something in that vicinity. If that's true, the competition is going to get nothing but fiercer. We are going to have competition from every other state looking for teachers. Right now, I think teachers are discouraged. I think they're demoralized. I think they're overextended. And I think that this body needs to address the problem this year. Somebody was in my office this morning, and she was telling me about her brother who's teaching, and he loves teaching. He loves what he does and he's good. He not only teaches from the book, but he takes kids out into the environment to study nature. And the kids are so excited about it. But for a number of reasons he's discouraged, and he's thinking about leaving teaching. I really weep for our children if this all comes to pass; if teachers get to the point where they decide they can no longer afford to be in the classroom, they aren't getting the kind of support they need from the public, and they leave. It would be too bad. So, Senator Thompson, I've supported your bill last year, I still like your bill, I still would like to do this, but I'm not going
