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in this skewed direction, to say then those who are going to go to these religious schools are limited to the funds in that religious school fund, and leave the two other funds for the kids going to public schools, make the two exclusive for public schools in the same way that the third one is exclusive for church schools?

SENATOR BYARS: I'm not certain I've come to a rational point of making a decision relative to that issue, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There would be a kind of symmetry and consistency, though, wouldn't there?

SENATOR BYARS: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You're separating the church schools from the public schools. You're creating a fund exclusively for the church schools. Since that has been done in the law, then why not leave that money that is available for the kids going to public schools exclusively available for them, for the public schools. There would be consistency if you did that,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...don't you think?

SENATOR BYARS: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So do I. Thank you, Senator Byars. Members of the Legislature, everybody knows the direction that I'm going. Everybody knows the question...the answers that ought to be given to those questions. Senator Byars is one of the few people who...on this floor, who would be willing to give a forthright answer to it. So that's why I'm not going around the floor asking others. But I want it to be crystal clear what it is that I'm talking about, what my amendments deal with, and the skewed situation that exists right now. It is skewed. And I want to skewer it.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time. Senator Chambers.
