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an open process, it has been fairer. We have had helpful staff, not that they weren't helpful last time, but things did proceed in a more orderly fashion this time. Part of that I suppose is because the computers are faster this time, too. But staff has been very helpful. We've had good legal guidance, and we had the kinds of public hearings I think that were necessary to have. By making them accessible to people all over the state, we did get good input from a lot of areas. And probably if we were honest about it, we would probably say that depending on the plan that was introduced, you naturally bring out different parts of the state; but we did give everybody who was affected by the plans an opportunity to speak. I think that the way the redistricting task force worked was very beneficial. And it kind of goes to the amendment that is going to be introduced pretty soon, and I don't know how procedurally this will work. But the understanding this time around was that the urban areas of the state would work within their own areas to try to develop plans for their particular areas, realizing and recognizing that there was going to be a shift because of the growth in the urban populations. There was kind of a gentlemen-ladies' agreement, if you were, that that is the way we would work. And then that once the Omaha and Lincoln areas were finished with their work, then that is when the rest of the state would be redistricted. A very difficult part of that I think this time around was the fact that we had the Madison County decision from ten years ago hanging over our heads so to speak. And that meant that there were three counties in the state that we really had to work around. If that had not been true, if that had not been part of the procedure this time, I think it would have been a lot easier to do redistricting in the rest of the state once you got past the Omaha and Lincoln areas. But the truth of the matter is nobody really wanted to challenge that idea, although I think it's going to be ironic when we get to Congressional redistricting and we talk about dividing a county, the county that took us to court last time is saying now, well, it wouldn't be too bad if we divided it between Congressional districts. But nevertheless, that is one of the provisions on our constitution that we at least have to take into consideration in a very serious way. I would like to...
