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a very...I think a very civil discussion about a subject that's really pretty hard to discuss in great detail. This is something unusual that we do. It has federal ramifications, federal overtones. Our congressional boundary lines on a day-to-day basis, as we sit here in the Legislature and we do our work, we pass our budget, we pass our laws, there are very few times when the particular congressional district that our counties are a part of will become a very big issue here in the Legislature. This is one of the very few times that I...since I've been here in nine years that I can remember even discussing anything that had to do with our...with our congressional representation. The other time might have been, most notably, was when we...we voted whether or not to allow for one vote for President per congressional district, and I'll remind all my democratic friends...do I have any democratic friends in here...there's a hand, (Laughter) there are two hands, three hands (laugh)...that I did vote for that. And so I just had...I didn't even plan on bringing that up but I thought about it and so there aren't very many times that we do that. Now, the guidelines that we have adopted do say, in the congressional district portion, whenever there is presented to the Legislature more than one plan that will substantially vindicate the objectives, preference will be given to the plan that provides the greatest degree of population equality. I say that again simply to emphasize that this plan has not even one person deviation. But in order to accomplish that, you do have to split two counties, one county being Sarpy County which has to be split, I believe. In any way that you cut this baby up, no matter what plan, there's going to be some division in Sarpy County. This plan, the amendment I am proposing, has a very small split in...what county was that...Gage County, in the northwest corner, and I know that that doesn't sit well with the representative from that area, but it isn't going to be met with open arms by almost anyone no matter what county that we do split. So I simply ask you to think about no matter what plan you adopt you are going to...you're going to split some county to some extent. I don't think the community of interest argument with Saline and Gage County is quite the same kind of a situation as you have in Madison County. I contend that Madison County is the hub of that area in northeast Nebraska; and if that has any relevance whatsoever, you'd be separating the hub
