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of the population of that district is in District 1, Congressional District 1; the remainder is in District 2. When you look at Papillion, again eyeballing it, I don't have the numbers, but I would argue that here it's 95 percent of the population stays in District 2. Just take a look at the two plans. You can eyeball them and make your own judgement. But as I look at them, Millard, in the committee plan, is much more egregiously divided than Papillion is in the Bromm plan. The reason the lines are not straight is because the city of Papillion does not have straight lines around its boundaries. The Bromm plan takes in nearly all of Papillion, keeps Bellevue whole, does all the things that we wanted to do. Keep those communities of interest whole. There's only a small fraction of Papillion that's outside. Most of it, in fact, is just the growth area. There aren't people there. When you look at the Bromm plan that we adopted yesterday, there aren't people there. Yes, Senator Thompson's correct, they're going to build a new high school there. But it's not there yet, and the people aren't there to go to that high school, necessarily. Out around it anyway, yet. So I would argue that the Bromm plan is fairer as far as keeping communities of interest together. The Millard School District, being the best example. The Bromm plan gives us the best of both worlds. And of course it does have the exact zero deviation, which we talked about yesterday as important to the United States Supreme Court. So I would oppose the bracket motion, and urge you to do the same. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: (Visitor introduced.) Senator Quandahl, followed by Senator Bourne, Schimek, Coordsen, Byars, Janssen, Brashear, Hilgert, Wickersham, and Thompson. Senator Quandahl.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Members of the body, one of the things that I wanted to kind of refocus at first, before I begin, I do stand to oppose the bracket motion. I would urge my colleagues to vote against this bracket motion, and get on with the business of what we were elected and sent here to do. And one of those things is redistricting. I guess I was encouraged by one of the things that I thought I heard Senator Coordsen saying, which was, we adopted the Bromm amendment last night, and so let's get on with the actual
