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think probably the worse thing the Democratic Party would think would be that you would move Gage and Saline. Having said that, I think there are some really valid, good reasons for sticking with the Bourne plan. It is the cleanest, most logical map that you can put together. It affects the fewest number of counties and it's really a good plan. But I'm...I'm a political realist and I don't think that it will stand up in this body to a vote to sustain it, and I...I don't really think that the Bromm amendment is acceptable either. So then we have to look at another option, and I think that other option is before us. Maybe there are other options. Maybe we should be looking at some more. You will notice on your little gadgets, there have been a number of other options filed. And I don't know that any of them are the correct options. No matter what we do here today, someone is going to be unhappy. And, Senator Bromm, I guess I just assumed that you were knowledgeable and in on the possibility of compromise, and if you weren't, then I understand where you were coming from, but that was just my assumption that you did know what was going on, and that there were discussions that were taking place. And, finally, Senator Quandahl, nobody questions that Senator Bromm has the right...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...to, or any other member has the right to introduce amendments to the redistricting bills. And, in fact, that is essentially what we are going to be doing here today. Everybody has the right to do that, and I would be the first to support that right. But I don't...I don't think that's really the issue here today. I think the issue here today is how we move this bill forward, and it's not going to move forward very fast, I don't think, unless we can find a compromise position. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Coordsen.

Everybody is talking about a compromise plan, while I was sitting here listening to the various people talk about the issues, how about a plan, and maybe I should get it drafted where the 3rd District fell below the Platte River until you got
