Nebraska that they...that that person believed were not doing business honestly and adequately. I was contacted Friday night, as I think...or over the weekend I was contacted Friday night, but I think over the weekend most of the members of the Legislature were talked to by a member of the Rules Committee, so I did have some forewarning of what the proposal would...was going to be. And certainly I was...today, when I came in that I was able to look at it and contemplate upon the effect that that might have. I suppose I'm somewhat known for "shaggy dog" stories that go on at a long time with no seeming point till we get to the end, and when you get to the end you've forgotten where I was started when we went down the path. But one of the things that we need to consider this morning that I think is...is important, although it's said somewhat facetiously, that when we're talking we ain't voting, and when we ain't voting we ain't hurting nobody, which means that we're simply extending the debate on an issue. Senator Chambers mentioned several individual issues that were important at the time, and were in fact better law as the result of the extended debate. I also would cautious as you...caution you as you approach your decision on this issue. And I, like Senator Brashear, have never been very concerned about the rules other than that the rule to suspend the rules and vote on the issue with no further debate stayed part of the...part of the rules. But beyond that the rules were something that have not been something of great interest. But all of us, at one point in time, all of us have been part of a majority and part of a minority. And one of the damnable problems with the democracy as...such as we have, is that we believe in majority rule. And I have read that the only thing worse than a dictatorship is an uncaring majority. And all of us are going to find the time to come in your career, even those that have just joined us, when you're going to be very uncomfortable with the position that you hold on an issue, and want to correct something and will have really no tool left. I don't know whether cloture was a good rule, whether eight hours, or six hours, or forty hours, or any of that is a magical answer. But be careful...
