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SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you. Senator Kruse.

SENATOR KRUSE: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. I would like to call Senator Brashear back to the microphone, if I might, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Brashear, would you respond?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. Speaker.

SENATOR KRUSE: Thank you. There was a situation in another state in a similar but not the same law where the woman shot herself in such a way as to kill the fetus. She was going nuts with her situation and nobody was going to help her, and that kind of thing. Under your amendment, would that be a...there would be other laws that she's breaking there, but under your amendment, would that be a charge that could be made against her?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: No, it would not.

SENATOR KRUSE: Thank you. The use of child in this really does let a person's mind go a little ways. I'm beginning to think maybe we should have a future law on the abuse of an unborn child. I had a situation where a judge put a woman, pregnant woman in prison, in jail, for seven months, protective custody for her unborn child, because she kept drinking and FAS was going to be the result, and that would be a burden on the society, and so he made the case for himself and did it. But is there a potential child abuse down the line as we keep defining these terms? Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, in the same way that I was trying to get Senator Foley to confront an issue directly, the same rule has to apply to me. LB 38, in 1977, was in fact a criminal code. We rewrote numerous...or I should say innumerable statutes. Many amendments of mine were adopted. We eliminated all types of hodgepodge, miscellaneous offenses. We classified all offenses
