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introduced and as the public hearing was held, and on line 11 of page 2 of the bill I see that it contains the words "at a place of detention"; "All interrogation and questioning that occurs at a place of detention shall be electronically recorded." Now I don't see that language in the amendment. That language went away and that suggests to me that it went away for some reason. And, again, on your...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BROMM: ...time, Senator Brashear, maybe you can explain that. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, on the Bruning amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I did not have the opportunity to hear everything Senator Bromm said, but he expressed the concerns that I had in the part of what he said that I did pick up. I was down in my office. You cannot put words into a statute of this kind which, on their face, can raise questions and lead to litigation where there need not be any. So, rather than repeat what Senator Bromm said, I'm not going to have much more to say on this amendment of Senator Bruning's except that I am opposed to it. I am in favor of Senator Bourne's bill, which is the amendment which is a part of the committee amendments that we're discussing now.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Engel.

SENATOR ENGEL: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I agree with the Bruning amendment. I believe it takes care of a problem in the...where I've been getting calls from my district, as far as law enforcement, as far as having this electronic equipment available to them in all of their...in all of their vehicles, et cetera. So the bill itself I like, but this amendment I think would alleviate the concerns of the people in my district. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Engel. Senator Stuhr, on the Bruning amendment.
