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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is there any money currently in the radioactive fund?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, we've spent about \$13 million so far in this lawsuit.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And is there any money left in it at this point, do you know?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, it's drawn down to the point we have about a million dollars in arrears right now in bills.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: When the money in this landfill fund was being invested, how or in what...how was it being invested, if you know?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I assume it would be with our State Investment Officer per all our money that's invested.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Was it invested in stocks, do you know?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Probably.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did it suffer any...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I don't have that report in front of me. We have...we have varying degree...we have that annual report, which we're due for a new one, by the way. I have 2001 or 2000. I do not have 2001, but we have a range of stocks and bonds and other investments that our Investment Officer does across the board.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now who is handling this case for the state? I just want to get a few things on the record.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: The Attorney General, and he has hired a legal team of...out of Washington, DC, Howrey, Simon, and Collier (phonetic), Shannon (phonetic), Scott (phonetic).

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That Washington, DC, firm is very expensive.
