SENATOR BRASHEAR: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. And that's all I wanted to ask Senator Brashear. That point has been made but I don't know how much attention is being paid to the points that are actually being made since apparently marching orders have been given. You all last session rolled over and gave Union Pacific a bill that has helped put us in the financial bind the state is in right now. You have given over to Union Pacific that. You think that putting one more person on a train, if the train company only wanted to have one, is going to bust that company? That's what you all think, that this bill is the difference between Union Pacific staying in business or not? I have served on committees which were approached by Union Pacific and that Burlington Northern representatives. They know the power that they have. They ooze it. They reek of it, but I'm usually able to kind of bring them back down to earth where they belong. I'm not impressed by them. I'm not intimidated by them. And I have seen the damage they have done to this state by being allowed to raid the treasury. So on the one hand you give them what they want, which you don't have to give them to bring them to Nebraska. They were coming here anyway, but you give them that gift. Then, on the question of safety, they tell you, don't do it, and that's enough. That's all you need to hear. The railroads don't like it, so don't do it. I'm going to have to start linking issues in here because life for a legislator can either be broken down into a multiplicity of little pigeon holes where each item is dealt with individually as though it's a freestanding issue, or it can be like a seamless web where we're considering what is in the best interest of the state and the citizens, and in that case...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the seamless web is like the web of a spider, the circular web. Something hits the far edge of it and it's communicated through all, by all those little threads throughout the web, and it notifies the spider that somebody is knocking at the door or somebody is invading. I look at what we do in this instance as a seamless web. When you all were
