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SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...okay.

SENATOR KREMER: I did kind of leave that up in the air. I know many of the states that do have casino gambling on the reservations have pretty large complexes of...of facilities. What would you anticipate here and who would pay for the investment of...of the...building the casinos and the structures? And many times motels and a lot of things like that go with it.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator, I can't answer that for certain. But my impression is that if we limit this to tribal reservations, we are not going to have the huge casinos that you see in some of the other states that some of the other tribes have.

SENATOR KREMER: Aren't the other states also on reservations? And it's the Indian (inaudible) control?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, but you're...you're...I mean, think about the state of Connecticut, for instance,...

SENATOR KREMER: Minnesota has many too so, yeah.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...small, tiny state, and travel distances aren't the same as they are in Nebraska. Our tribes are somewhat isolated, particularly the Santee.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay. Would...would they be contracted then...do you know how the other states do it? Do they contract with someone to come in and...and run the casinos for them?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: They do. And that is handled, again, both according to federal law and to the...a rate...the terms of the compact that is formed.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay. Okay. Thank you. These are some questions that I was just wondering about.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay.
