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provide more...more profit, or more value to the hog, for instance, by feeding it corn, or the cattle by feeding it corn. We add...we add value to cattle by breeding programs that provide for the right type of rib eye, for instance. And we do it to hogs by providing for the right type of leanness. The American people have asked us to produce hogs that are lean, and we can do that. We can do that by selective genetics. But the problem becomes, after we add the value, who is going to pay us for the value we add? All the corporations want the value-added products. They admit that they want us to do this, but they don't want to pay us for it. Bottom line for corporate America is make dollars for the stockholders, the shareholders. Make sure that those people make money. They don't really care about the guys that are producing the product. We can't pass laws that provide conscience for the packers. That isn't going to happen. We can't say, look packers, we've got this bill out here and it's going to give you a conscience and you have to start paying us for the product that we raise, the value we add. When the economists come and tell us about all these wonderful things, the ag economists, they tell us, well, we had a...we had a special economist come in from the northeast someplace, I think Minnesota or Michigan or someplace, to talk to this task force that Senator Wehrbein and I were on a couple of years ago, and he told us all these wonderful things. He said, you've got to add value and you've got to do this and you've got to do that, and this is salvation for production agriculture. When I asked him the question, how do we get paid for the value we add, he looked stunned, like, I don't know what...I haven't been asked this question before; I don't know. Well, I know, and I know that somehow or another we've got to get corporate America to start paying us for the products that we raise, and we do that by doing country of origin labeling, we do that by putting a ban on packer ownership of livestock,...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR DIERKS: ...we do that by making them report prices to us, fair reporting. There's a lot of things we can do and we've done some of that in this Legislature. We need to do it nationwide. If we had a ban on packer ownership nationwide that'd be the biggest boon, the biggest advantage that the
