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amendments indicates a tentativeness that is...bodes very, very poorly...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR TYSON: ...for the results. I won't even take the minute. I will close by urging you to think about this and then vote against the A bill. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Coordsen, motion to indefinitely postpone.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you. Mr. President and members of the body, Senator Chambers is sincere in his efforts and one of the things I have enjoyed over these past years is his scriptural quotes that flow like wine upon parched ground, just wonderful to listen to. But when I listen to this this morning and people say, if not now, when, I'm reminded of a couple of things. First of all, the 11th Chapter of Proverbs, 26th verse says, people curse the man who holds his grain for a higher price, yet bless the man that has food for them in their time of need. And the other thing that comes to mind is that the only parable that I'm aware of that is repeated three times in the first four books of the New Testament is the parable about a prophet being not without honor except in his own town...even in his own town or, in some of the versions, in his own family. I have been a member of the agricultural family, as I said, all of my life and on my own for actually 47 years, I misspoke, 47 years of raising food. And it used to be that the demands of local government of me for property taxes to support those services fell within my means when I was a young person trying to get established. This last year, because of circumstances that I alluded to when I spoke about planting a seed and not getting a harvest, my property taxes will be greater than what my Schedule F net income was from the farm, and that's okay. That's part of the...part of the business. Here in the Legislature, as I look back over 16 years, what few little successes I've had have not been in the field of agricultural issues nor farm issues. They have been in urban issues. They have been in juvenile issues. Senator Landis and I were successful in rewriting the workers' compensation laws and on the year prior to that I was successful
