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to do now, but, be of good cheer, we'll be better at this very shortly because if you'll read the anticipated shortfall for the next biennium, we're talking over \$410 million. We're just warming up, folks. Mr. Speaker, I would like to give the balance of my time to Senator Bromm.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Bromm, you have two minutes.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay, thank you very much, Senator Tyson. And this may be the only time I have a chance to speak on this bill so I'll try to be to the point and brief. The idea that business should contribute to the shortfall that we're in is the right idea. There's no question about that. The suggestion that we should do it in this fashion is not the right idea for a number of reasons that have been stated this morning. And I think probably the issue of our obligations and the fact that we have an agreement that we expect the other party to comply with is a major consideration. If we could turn the clock back just a little bit, and I wish we could; we can't; maybe it's not too late if this bill is bracketed. I think if a concerted effort were made by the Department of Economic Development to solicit cooperation from the business community on this program, some companies might find it...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...more helpful to them to use the credits at a later time. If there were concerted effort in that regard, and if, with permission of those participants, the public was made aware of who supported the state by cooperating to amend the contract during these times, I think maybe we would have something. I realize that that's not something that we can do at this stage, but it's an effort that I think should still be made, even if this bill is bracketed or killed. But I am going to support the bracket motion. I think we need to move on to the next bill to try to see if we can find some solutions, and so that's where I will be on it. And that's not...that's not an easy decision, but I think in at least the way I view all of what I've heard, I think that's the decision I have to make. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
