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afford to pay through the income tax, you are getting at some of the people that you really want to get to, I think.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And I think what you just said about connecting the two has made it a bit more attractive. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Thank you, Mr. President. I would like to give my time to Senator Chambers also.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Kremer. Members of the Legislature, they're just trying to wear me out. No, seriously, we are maintaining our momentum in the hopes that when people come back into the Chamber we will see them standing tall, chests out, shoulders back, chins high, a smile on their face, and they can tell us it is done. But if they come in here looking like the way Senator Tyson usually looks, until I get him straightened out, then we know that we're still in trouble. But I will not believe that all has been in vain because we at least have people talking to each other now who need to be talking to each other; the important people in the Legislature. But you see where I've cast my lot? I've cast my lot with my ordinary brothers and sisters; those of us who are always overlooked, who don't count for anything, but really do the drudge work. Somebody always has to be there. Well, I might use some examples that some of you are too young to understand, but when you would burn coal, there would be a very hard residue known as a clinker. Somebody has to take out the clinkers; somebody has to take out the ashes; somebody has to keep the flue clean; and some people even know what it means to bank a fire. Many people don't know what that means. I see Senator Connealy knows. He must have read a bit. But there are people who must do those things. Our society could not operate without those people performing those very essential services, but the irony in all this is that the people who perform the most essential, necessary services usually make the least amount of money, are accorded the least respect and consideration.
