things only when black people or those who are messed over strike back. You need to see what provoked it. And since white people think they can get away with this mess, there has to be some black person who is willing to say, oh, no, you won't. But that is now in the record and I intend to pursue it. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion on the advancement of LB 957. Seeing none, Senator Landis, did you wish to close on advancement?

SENATOR LANDIS: Only in so far as to say it would be my best guess that the Comptroller of the Currency would have a very real interest in that. On its face, that is patent racism, in my...in my way of looking at that, and I would hope that the Comptroller of the Currency doesn't have so much to do on their desk that they can't promptly get to handling a complaint like that. I would ask for the advancement of LB 957.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Landis. You heard the closing on advancement of LB 957. The question before the body is, shall that bill be advanced to E & R Initial? All in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Voting on advancement of LB 957. Have you all voted who care to? Record, please, Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: LB 957 does advance. Mr. Clerk, next agenda item.
