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with the responsibility of promulgating rules to implement the procedures for administering drug court programs. In jurisdictions with drug court programs, the governing body of the programs may enter into interlocal agreements with state and local agencies to implement and manage such programs. Also under the committee amendment, we provide that when the defendant is participating in a court-ordered drug treatment program, a judge may order drug testing, require jail time as a sanction for noncompliance, or impose other conditions deemed reasonably necessary to ensure compliance with the drug treatment. With that summary of the committee amendments, I would urge the adoption of the committee amendments and the advancement of LB 1115. And I would yield some time. Because Senator Chambers has been very much a part of these discussions, I would yield the remainder of my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Chambers, eight minutes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, and I will not need nearly that many. I've talked to Senator Aguilar and Senator Brashear about some of the questions I would like to have answered, and there is some drafting areas of the bill which Senator Aguilar and I will work on between now and the time the bill gets to Select File. So the types of questions I have would not be productively raised at this point because nobody on the floor could answer them. But by my willingness to not impede the movement of the bill, those who are administering these courts that I may choose to present questions to will be in a position where it would be wise to be as generous towards me in answering my questions as I intend to be today in allowing the bill to move. Thank you, Senator Brashear, and Senator Aguilar.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Dwite Pedersen, please.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: This, thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm speaking about the bill. We will speak about the amendment later. I'm supportive of the drug courts, have been. I was very instrumental in getting the money for the first drug court in this state in Douglas County. I was part of that from the ground up and I have seen it grow, and I support
