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get all the people who want the cuts. Then we hear from the people who want the services and don't want the cuts. And they don't exactly give us any specificity with regard to how they think we ought to pay for them, and they say, it's our job, figure it out, and do it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Business was specific in not wanting the LB 775 and other economic development particulars taken away. And some of them would have us believe that if we put a sales tax on, and sunset it, why, that will be nirvana. I don't think most of us believe that the sunset won't be the next object that somebody will want to adjust. It seems to me that the moment is now, and if you consider March and its \$36 million shortfall, as we'll call it; if you consider the Wall Street Journal article the other day that talked to you about what's happened in Nebraska with regard to receipts and capital gains; and you analyze the facts, you have a sense that we will never, again, see \$3.3 billion worth of...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: ...capital gains as that was reported.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brashear. You've heard the opening on AM3494 to LB 1085. (Visitors introduced.)

On with discussion of the Brashear amendment, AM3494. Those wishing to speak are Senators Engel, Brashear, Don Pederson, Beutler, Wickersham, Maxwell, Bourne, Coordsen, Kruse, and Bromm. Senator Engel.
