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we're here for, is to make these tough choices. So with that, I am supporting the amendment and, hopefully, the rest of you will also. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Janssen. The next speaker is Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Madam...Madam President and members of the body, I simply like...rise to support this. I don't see Senator Coordsen on the floor. I guess what if I had my druthers, and I could vote 25 or 30 times, I would have done the income tax, even though that hits my district the hardest, and so forth, but it...we're...would just restate it back to where it was before, and I think what we've read you, the principles of a high quality state revenue system, and one is a ri...relies on a balanced variety of revenue sources. We only have two revenue sources, sales and income tax, and so we're, with this LB 1085 amendment, we do both of those. And I applaud the people that drafted the amendment. I think putting the cigarette tax into the Reserve is the place to do it, if we're going to do it, because I think that is not that reliable a source. It's kind of shaky. So I simply would simply rise and ask the people to support this amendment to LB 1085. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. The next speaker is Senator Thompson.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body. I've been taking a look at this plan and also the Governor's veto list and trying to digest all of this, and I have a few questions that maybe I could ask of Speaker Kristensen, if you have...just so that I understand procedurally where we're heading here and what...what options continue to exist.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Kristensen.
