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easy as we, you know, making it a crime to issue the bad check, there's...that's a little tricky. Making it a lien is a little tricky as well. That's the reason I...I didn't want to delve into that at this point.

SENATOR BROMM: I would argue they haven't paid it. I would argue that the ledger that counts should reflect an arrearage in child support and that the collection efforts, full force, should kick in. I mean the fact that the payee has received the money is okay, but the payor hasn't paid it, and so I think there's a violation. And we talked about this briefly the other day and we didn't have time to...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Right.

SENATOR BROMM: ...explore it anymore. But as I think about it, I think...I think the payor is in violation of that court order and it should...it should kick in collection efforts.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: And it will still show him delinquent. The issue is what powers do you have to go collect on behalf of the state and there may need to be some additional authorizations made in our statute to do that. That's...that's the answer I received from, well, a couple of the authorized attorneys and, in particular, one of the full-time county attorneys here in Lancaster County who...who's been on the commission. She's very knowledgeable and...

SENATOR BROMM: Are all the enforcement efforts for child support, they're not all centralized, are they? They're still laying out there in different areas...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Right.

SENATOR BROMM: ...of the state. So I would hope that they would enlist all of those efforts. I think it's a...I think it's a terrific challenge and I think your amendment is absolutely necessary and I think we're going to have to go further. I mean, I think we're probably going to have to try to follow up on this or we'll be...when we get half a million dollars in the hole where does that money come from? You know,
