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question.

SENATOR TYSON: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: This is the question from the Dean to Senator Tyson. Senator Tyson, if you did not vote for the veto override package, why would you vote to override several millions of dollars that were vetoed out of the budget by voting for LB 1115? I'm just curious. The Dean is curious.

SENATOR TYSON: I will tell you, Senator Chambers, that I considered not voting as I did, and this was primarily because Senator Synowiecki, who has an area of expertise in this, said that the bill was, in his opinion, insufficiently developed.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And he was correct. So why did you...

SENATOR TYSON: That's your assumption. I assumed that he knew what he was talking about, and I still assume that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that's why you voted contrary...

SENATOR TYSON: However, I would rather have the bill in place and correctable than not have the bill in place. A lot of the things we do here, we don't get right the first time, but to do something I think is important. That's one of the reasons that I was one of the cosigners of this bill that was introduced by Senator Aguilar. I think these drug programs in court are important, and I think that at least they are some sort of an answer to what is at least in my district an increasingly dangerous problem.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Tyson. You gave...you answered the part of the question that I asked you, and it will stand as your response. I don't have enough time to go around the floor, but I did want to ask you because you generally are consistent, and I was aware that you did not vote to override the Governor, but you would have voted knowingly to override him in this bill. Now I don't know that everybody who voted for it would say the same thing. I had problems with the bill from the beginning. Brothers and sisters, even the Dean may have
