I'll let you look at that, but call your attention to Medicaid, 16.5 percent increase. Then look at the bottom line. Overall General Funds, which is still be talked about, 9 percent increase. It is still true, but the drivers essentially are in the middle: Medicaid; development disabilities, which we kept on our track for stairstep provider rates; community-based mental health; higher ed student aid programs, even though we cut it there is significant money there; but we did cut aid to individuals. School aid is up 17 percent. That was a \$97 million issue, state aid to schools, and so on down the line. I don't want to press too long here. The next page, on page 7, some of the drivers once again, salaries and insurance costs across the top there, I'm looking at the far right-hand column, the second one down, \$136 million. We are people intensive. TEEOSA aid is \$193 over the two years; Medicaid up \$122 million over the two years; Tecumseh, \$30 million, and others. I think that's enough on that. You can study that over the two years. Then I won't go into detail, believe me, on the next two pages, but if you want the actions in General Fund budget actions in the 2001 Session, that's on page 8. That will be the totals. Then on page 9 is the General Fund budget actions out of the special session, which was last fall. And then on page 10 is the General Fund budget actions that we just completed, the 2002. I...might want to take a note. I forget already but on page 9, toward the bottom of the page where it says "Across-the-Board Cuts", special session, those were 2 and 2.5 percent for the university, 1 percent for the state colleges. All other agencies took a 4 percent cut the first year and a 5 percent cut the second year. And remember we start from the base, so it's a 4 percent cut the first year, the next year is 5 percent, but it's really 1 percent additional from the original base. So if you turn over to page 10, across-the-board cuts then on universities and colleges again 1 percent this year, but the across-the-board cut all other agencies was 3 percent, except for those "24/7s" that we did not cut, we held harmless. The bottom line is that some agencies have taken an 8 percent cut, 5 and 3, 4 and 3, 5 and 3. And the last page, 11, is a summary of all the veto actions, so if you need a thumbnail sketch of all of the actions that were vetoed you can see that down on page 11. Hopefully this will help. I'm also having done, it will be a thumbnail sketch, if you will, if you
