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work that I do on this floor and the comments that I make. But I think this bill is one of the more positive things that will emerge from the Legislature.

SENATOR ENGEL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. The Chair recognizes Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you. Would Senator Schrock yield to a question, please?

SENATOR ENGEL: Would you yield, Senator Schrock?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Senator Schrock, in Douglas County, the officials there at the DMV are extremely well trained and they do ask you if you want to donate organs on your driver's license when you apply, and they also inform you that, in fact, the final decision will be made by your family. There are those who might make a different decision if they thought that perhaps there could be some additional costs incurred by their family in this event, and I'm wondering if there is any operative date in here that would take that into consideration so that people in the future marking their licenses would come under this provision, or would this step back in time and go to the people who have already designated it with the understanding that their family members would make the final decision?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Redfield, you bring an issue that may be important to some people. This bill does not have an emergency clause in it. I don't know how much of the public is going to become aware of this, and you are probably correct in your assessment that people are told at the time that they become a donor that their immediate family would have a chance to change that. However, I believe when this law becomes in effect, that would mitigate probably what some people were told and you would...but I also believe that most people, when they make the conscientious decision to become an organ donor, they're serious about the intent that if there's something useful when they die that some other person could benefit from receiving. But you bring an issue I can't answer. I do know the bill does not have the emergency clause so there would be some time in case someone says, well, wait a minute, this isn't
