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have talked to the Department of Roads, and they convinced me that this is something that needed to be done. These were...statutes were put on the books before counties had zoning. And I know part of the reason Senator Beutler opposes this bill is he says there's all these counties not zoned. Let me tell you, there's only five counties that would allow a junkyard to come in. These others have the comprehensive zoning plans in place. If somebody is going to make an issue of a confined animal feeding operation or junkyard or something, I imagine I'd spur them on to do something else. Got a lot of material here. Mosquito abatement, going back to that part, one never knows where discussion on junkyards is going. But mosquito abatement, I didn't know we had a section of statutes dealing with strictly mosquito abatement. Article 29...this is in Chapter 71-2917. Elimination of mosquitos, flies, insects; county and city of the primary class; jointly or severally; powers. Any county and any city of the primary class located therein shall have the powers, jointly or severally, to take all necessary and proper steps for the extermination of mosquitos, flies, and other insects. It goes on. Counties or cities, severally or jointly, have the power to take care of that. If they are harbored in a junkyard, they have the power to go in there and force those people to clean it up. Department of Roads, we can't find where Department of Roads has that authority to handle abatement of mosquitos. (Laugh) But there's a chapter in the law book here that has mosquito abatement. Just...there's just two sections to it, 2917, 2918. But it's in here. It's counties and cities have that. The rationale with the bill remains the same. Department of Roads, obviously, isn't looking for other work. Their budget is stretched like everyone else's. This was put in place before zoning. There's five counties that really don't have any zoning. And I can admit to that. Department of Roads is not doing anything. I found one example here where a salvage yard was cleaned up. It was apparently a big eyesore. I'd be glad to listen to any others. If they have stories that, you know, they can document them, fine. The mayor of Ravenna says, hey, we had a problem, we cleaned it up in Ravenna. The Department of Roads apparently had nothing to do with it. I can't imagine Department of Roads employees going out and saying, well, there's mosquitos here, or that. I don't think they have the
