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time in any session from doing anything, and we think we're going to do something else? We will be bought and sold. Not because any of us are bought and sold, since there are some people who like to beat up on that, I want to decline that. But because there will be such huge profit potential that that special interest will become predominant. Now somewhere in between these two extremes there must be an opportunity for us to provide some leadership.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Time has expired.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Maybe we can...

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Brashear, how can it be that you speak so much sense and sometimes so little sense? (Laughter) You say let the people put the initiative on. And yet you are the biggest opponent of Initiative 300, which has more words than the Bible, and which...I yield my time to Senator Brashear.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: The only gubernatorial candidate in the Republican primary in 1986, when you were running in the Democratic primary, who supported Initiative 300.

SENATOR BEUTLER: (Microphone malfunction) ...putting that into the constitution.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: The...but, Senator Brashear, where he is really arguing good sense, it goes back to what we were trying to work out before. We need to get time off the floor to bring these bills together, and that's why we were arguing earlier we need to advance both bills, and then spend time working it out. But I want to go back and indicate to you the deficiencies of this particular bill because it would be very bad policy to put this language into law, especially into the constitution. We
