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SENATOR BROWN: ...it really depends, for the demonstration, on what agencies choose to participate. I could find out for you, just on one small aspect which I think would be educative, how much the university is spending on the lockbox...

SENATOR COMBS: Lockbox. Yeah.

SENATOR BROWN: ...process that they're entering into, because I think that would show something. But I don't think that I can speak to any (inaudible) savings.

SENATOR COMBS: Right. I appreciate it. Thank you. I think the general concept we can be presumptive on, and that is you bank money the same day you get it, you save money, you get money. You leave money lay, no matter what the amount, you lose money. If this is a way that we can bank money faster, then I say let's try it. We owe it to our people...fellow Nebraskans at least to demonstrate. All we're asking is for two measly agencies to try it. What's the harm in that? If the idea chomps, we dump it, we don't use it. If the idea is good, then we get more people on board, we gradually get more agencies, perhaps as their computer systems age, and systems turn over, and they've got to have new software. Then we introduce it then. There are opportune times. There are ways to make it work, and ways to give it a try. But to actually just dump it up-front without giving it a try...and maybe I'm being naive, but I think we owe our people a little bit more than that. We owe a chance at this idea that seems to have, at least from a business perspective, a lot of possibility. So I would ask you...I know some of us are sitting here, perhaps our minds are already made up. It's an idea that came from the Treasurer, and the Treasurer has perhaps a history of not getting along so well with Investment Council and people that we've been involved with. And, yes, there's some personality things there that aren't so good. And I would hope that my colleagues do not already have their mind made up, and that perhaps they can listen to reason and be swayed to at least give us an opportunity to show that this might work.
