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forward with this because we are...we have elected them and we need to give them the latitude to vote the way they want to, and we do it down here as senators. We're elected by our people and they allow us to vote the way we think it should be and how we represent our district. So I don't want to tie their hands up any more, so I'm going to oppose this amendment, and hopefully we can move on with the bill. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Jones. Senator Kremer, on the Preister amendment.

SENATOR KREMER: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members. I was a...I am a member of the Natural Resources Committee, which heard LB 165, and I felt very comfortable that a management team could do probably a better job. I know there's been some problems there and a professional management, I thought, could probably do a better job at maybe less cost or at least no more cost. So I feel very comfortable. And I know there's been some discussion on the liability. Actually, if there's negligence on the part of the management, they would be liable, but if there's not negligence on their part we would be liable, but we are also liable now so I don't know what change there would be. I would like to ask Senator Preister a question, if I could.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Preister, will you yield to a question from Senator Kremer?

SENATOR PREISTER: Yes, I will.

SENATOR KREMER: The term "extraordinary circumstances," is there a definition for that? I kind of thought, how do we know what's extraordinary? Maybe one...something extraordinary in one person's mind is not in another. Is there a definition somewhere to that or...

SENATOR PREISTER: Yes, Senator. At first, I was not sure about putting a definition in, but I did and...

SENATOR KREMER: Maybe I didn't see it. I'm sorry.

SENATOR PREISTER: ...that definition is on...
