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I'll yield the rest of my time to you.

SENATOR AGUILAR: Okay. One thing that I had in the conversation with Chief Justice Wright was, it was his intention to try to make them as close to each other as possible, so that when they did a study down the road and they did a study to look at statistics to see what's working and what's not working, they would have all this to look at, but they would be true statistics, because things were being done the same. There's not an "A" and "B" version. There's one version, and they could really determine honest statistics as far as what is working and how it's working. Apples to apples, if you will. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Are you through, Senator Aguilar?

SENATOR AGUILAR: My light?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Are you through?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. President, members of the body, what I intend to do with this amendment is simply...I think there should be, Senator Synowiecki, I think there should be some uniformity. And if we're going to have a court system, and that's the way...if we're going to have a drug court system, it should be under the leadership of the Supreme Court. And I think that's one of the things that we're trying to do with this. We're getting...and the reason the program hasn't expanded, what...from my sources, hasn't expanded beyond the four programs, is simply the judges are concerned without some guidance from the Supreme Court. And so what my amendment does is simply say that we will have drug courts, and we'll have guidance from the Supreme Court. And we'll give some recognition to drug courts. And so I simply ask for your support of the amendment.
