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with them, ask questions. When the time comes advance it to Select File. Give the ag community a chance to digest how this affects agriculture. I think let's keep a positive face on this. If we're ever going to have a relief on property taxes, I think part of the solution is going to be to broaden the sales tax base. I've never been a fan of taxing business inputs, including agriculture business inputs. And so I would say let's keep a positive face on this. Let's give it a try. We don't know where this road is going to lead us to, but I'm willing to walk down that road and see what's at the end of it. And if I don't like what's at the end, we always have the option of going back to another plan. But I commend Senator Brashear for what he has done here, and the Appropriations Committee for advancing this out of committee, and I think we should listen. We know that we're going to have to generate some more revenue. That's not pleasant. And so I would encourage the members of the ag community in this body, or those who represent agriculture areas of this state to be patient with this. There's things I don't like. For example, if you broaden the sales tax base, that means more revenue for urban areas because it's just going to mean more revenue for the urban areas.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHROCK: But there is things that offset this, and so let's take a look at it, and let's keep a positive face on this. If you don't have change, you're going to get what you've always got. And what we've gotten, as far as taxes on agriculture in the state, most of my friends back home will tell me it's not good. So let's keep a positive face and maybe this change will bring something positive. And that's what I'm looking forward to.
