are allowed to keep the guns in their cars rather than let them be secured at the building, then police must assume that every stolen vehicle is potentially a source of weapons for thieves. She goes on, in another e-mail, and says that she knows a young man who is a friend of hers who has a huge ugly scar on his chest and has lost spleen and parts of other vital organs because a friend of his was playing with his father's gun and pointed it and pulled the trigger, thinking there were no bullets in the gun. The father was always very open with his two children and explained all that he could about safe handling of his handgun and warned them never to handle it, but kids will be kids. His son disregarded all the information he had received over the years. His father is now very vocal and resolutely against owning anything but hunting rifles which are safely locked away. She says, I'm deeply concerned about child safety. I feel it is the height of irresponsibility for Nebraskans to pass a concealed carry bill that does not ensure completely secure safety locks to be in place at all times. She says, I go to the grocery store several times a week because I care for two elderly family members. Every time I shop, I see them...every time I shop, I see between two to five open purses in shopping carts and the owners turned away, examining food on the shelves. When I have time, I tell the ladies that I could have easily reached in and grabbed their billfold or their entire purse. Three of these ladies have told me, yes, I should know better; I've already had my purse stolen while grocery shopping. If these guns with no safety locks are allowed to be carried in purses, this means stealing them is easy. Give me permission and I could easily steal a hundred purses a week. That's a promise. And then she goes on to talk about specifics in the bill which say a permit to carry a concealed handgun shall be issued to a specific individual only. She says, I don't read anything in this document that limits the carrier to one weapon. They could be...they could conceivably...
