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card when I was first married, and my neighbor down the street who was divorced by her husband and had been in a marriage for 20-some years could not get a credit card in her own right. And if you don't think that wasn't difficult in this day and age, you don't know. When I was wanting to teach school in Hastings, Nebraska, they wouldn't even look at my resume at the high school because my husband was already employed there. I wasn't cut out to teach junior high school, for heaven sakes, but they wouldn't even look at my resume. Those kind of things happened in the past and not that far distant past, and we forget those things because some of those things have changed, but not all of those things have changed. And I believe the Women's Commission has provided a real service for this state. And in the broad scheme of things, if we can't continue to fund them, and I know the Appropriations Committee had a struggle with this. And, in fact, Senator Pederson, you and I had this conversation a little while ago. I think it's remarkable that we don't have more amendments being offered to the Appropriations Committee bill than we do this year. And I think it's testimony to the great job that you have done. But I also think that, in all fairness, we ought to give the commission one more year, time to regroup, and to figure out what happens next. And with that, I would ask for the adoption of the amendment, AM1343, to Senator Chambers' floor amendment.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Schimek. You've heard the closing. The question before us then is the adoption of FA1343, which is an amendment to FA1341. All in favor of the amendment please vote aye; and opposed please vote nay. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Mr. Chair...Mr. Speaker, I'd ask for a call of the house.

SPEAKER BROMM: A call of the house has been requested. All in favor of a call of the house please vote aye, and opposed nay. Please record.

CLERK: 31 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, to place the house under call.

SPEAKER BROMM: The house is under call. Unexcused senators,
