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perfectly. Maybe that can work with house building. But they usually don't build houses that way. It certainly is not going to work when we're law making. So I'm not getting my way by the adoption of this amendment. Nobody is getting his or her way. What is happening is that we're removing things from all of our way, so that we who have an interest in this plan, or program, are going to be forced to sit together and work it out, or be left in the dust. So the adoption of this amendment will require all of those who have an interest in need-based aid to say, even if gritting our teeth while we say it, come, let us reason together. I hope you will adopt this amendment. If you have any questions, I will answer them. I'm sure anybody else who I've mentioned as having had a part in this would be willing to answer any questions you would put to them. Thank you, Mr. President. I didn't hear you.

SENATOR JANSSEN PRESIDING

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I wanted to hear that, because I don't hear that very often. Thank you.

SENATOR JANSSEN: On the Chambers amendment, Senator Raikes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Senator Chambers has explained very well what the approach is here. We would leave the discussion, or have the discussion, rather, of need-based aid sort of in its entirety, on LB 574, which is a bill that's already on General File. In fact, we've begun the discussion. I support this. I think this is a sensible approach. And I urge your support as well. Thank you.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Raikes. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Janssen, members of the Legislature, I very much appreciate Senator Bromm and whoever was involved in the meeting working these things out. It's what we need to do on a lot of different matters. And so I'm going to be supporting this amendment. But to some extent, from the point
