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the schools have had competition. Class I...or, not Class I. The big school, what do you call it? Class A schools? And then on down. We have three different categories of funding. Schools through a competition have entered into that, and they were awarded funding to go ahead and promote a program within their own community. And I know various schools, Arlington was part of that. Many others across the state have come up with programs. That was a three-year program. And so yes, we're running out of that now. And this is a way to keep at least a portion of it, not at the \$7 million figure, but at a much smaller figure, to keep that program still operating. Be glad to answer any question that you might have from that. Did you have...?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Jensen, were you asking a question, or were...?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, I...yeah, I'll be glad to answer any question that Senator Raikes might have on that, or anyone else, as far as that goes.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Raikes,...

SENATOR JENSEN: If he wanted any of my time.

SPEAKER BROMM: You're yielding time to Senator Raikes to ask a question? Senator Raikes, do you need time?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes. Thank you, Senator Jensen. So this is, in effect, a new program. Because we had a three-year commitment, which we sort of funded. And now we're sort of beginning on a new continuation of the program. Is that a fair statement or not?

SENATOR JENSEN: It continues the program.

SENATOR RAIKES: But isn't it true that as originally envisioned it was a three-year program?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes it was. But it was really envisioned also that it would go on from there, and probably at the \$7 million
