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And I did a good job, I think, patting myself on the back here. But anyway, they have to elect good people. So I think...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...maybe...I wasn't going to vote for this thing of Rick's...Mick Mines'. Senator Mines, I'm sorry. But I think maybe we should. Why not? They're a board. Let them take the guff. Let them take the...let the buck fall back on them, so to speak here. So I think we should support the Mines amendment, and let it, you know, fall where it will. If they don't have the guts to say, we don't want a new car, we don't want a new this, we don't want a new this, we don't want to do this, let it fall back on them. Let's open it up here. Let's give them the chance to make a decision, rather than falling back on dear old dad, which in this case is probably the Legislature. We don't always know what's right here for the counties. Or do we? It's like Senator Bourne tried to do there awhile ago, because the school boards, probably some of them aren't doing their job. Hate to say that. But like I said, if the shoe fits, wear it. But I hope they get the message that it isn't...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...one hour a month, two hours a month, three hours a month. It's big time. They're spending...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...75 percent of our dollars. That's millions...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...of dollars. Time? You didn't give me a minute, Mr. Speaker. (Laughter) Sorry about that. You got me.

SPEAKER BROMM: You may have not heard it, Senator Cudaback. (Laughter) Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Raikes.
