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cuts that Senator Erdman has proposed? There are definite great personal opinion on where Senator Erdman would cut, but I don't think there's any consensus in this amendment. Where are we going to go from here? I would yield whatever time I have left to Senator Wehrbein.

SPEAKER BROMM: You have one minute, Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, Senator Byars. You're the first one that's yielded me time today, after we've spent three months on the budget, and had a complete layout and a complete explanation of what we did and why. I'm seriously considering a bracket this afternoon so that we can digest what's all in this. That's the thing that probably bothers me the most, is there's some far-reaching implications. And I'm sitting here thinking, I'm not sure many of you even heard a word I said this morning as I started down the details of this, particularly in the Supreme Court. It's been made about the state wards. State wards is simply going to end up as a deficit, is all it will do. So we can short these things at this time, in Medicaid and other things, and all it will do is come back as a deficit. I'd like to ask Senator Erdman a question, if I might.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Erdman, would you yield?

SENATOR ERDMAN: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I don't know whether I have time. In the University of Nebraska cuts, do you have allowance for the forestry program and the veterinary student program?

SENATOR ERDMAN: I do.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: They are earmarked back in?

SENATOR ERDMAN: They are.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time. Thank you, Senator Wehrbein and Senator Erdman. Mr. Clerk, do you have items for the record?
