Nebraska and for we people who have struggled to try to survive in this...today's economy. And I think he needs to be recognized for the things he's done. However, Senator Chambers is human, and although he is right about 97-98 percent of the time, I think in this particular case he may be wrong. I looked at the process that we're in and it's difficult for me to understand, when we have so many agencies trying to do the same thing and, unfortunately, in so many cases competing with one another, rather than cooperating. And this is the thing that's always bothered me. We start another agency and they become all...automatically start to compete with somebody that's already existing. Whether the development, Rural Development Commission is good or not, I'm not here to address. I'm just here to talk about the fact that with all the commissions, and I think Senator Baker has enumerated a number of them, public power districts, and University of Nebraska, Department of Agriculture, DED, and the development districts. They are all fine. They all do good things for the state. But the thing that bothers me, we end up spending so much money with the commissions that we don't have any money left to do any programs in many cases. And I don't mean that as a blanket statement. It's just that it happens at times when we start up new programs. And I go back to my original theme. I get very disenchanted with the competition that develops between agencies who are trying to do the same job, but don't want to work with somebody else because they want the credit. They want the credit for what happens and so they are not willing to work with somebody else to make it happen. And those are the things that bother me about this whole issue, and that's why I'm not going to support the underlying bill, and I'm not going to...I'm not going to...I'm going to support the...I'm not going to support the motion to suspend simply because I think we ought to move ahead with other things. And I agree that probably this is an issue that should come up during the regular session when we have plenty of time to make full debate and let everybody have a chance to get their voice in. But I just want to end by saying I don't think Senator Chambers ought to take offense to the fact that maybe once or twice in his life he has been wrong. And I, again, want to reiterate he has done some tremendous things, as he indicated himself, and I certainly 100 percent agree with him, the things he has done for rural Nebraska, the things he
