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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, Senator Foley had told us earlier that when this material is sent home, that's when the phone begins to ring, parents are irate. I listened to what Senator Foley said. Now he tells us that one young woman who, when she became a senior, finally got up enough nerve to talk to him. If it took getting up nerve to talk to him about a piece of legislation, what about these young girls who have been abused by their parents and are being told, go to them and tell them that you want an abortion? Why cannot he connect these things? Senator Foley is not going to harm this young woman. At least I don't believe he would. I don't know why she had to get up her nerve to come talk to Senator Foley. Kids don't have to get up their nerve to come talk to me. I'll tell you what the situation is. When one person says something that certain senators want, and it conforms to what they want to do because of their religious view, that one person becomes "everybody," and based on what that one person said, the senator springs into action. Suppose a bevy of young women came to Senator Foley and said they're being mistreated at the university, or they think they should have the right to have this information. Do you think he would comply with the principle he established here, and say, because these young women say that this information would help them, therefore I'm going to help them get this information? Certainly not. I know it and you know it, too. I'm a practical politician. I don't do that kind of stuff like Tom Osborne and these other hypocrites, who run for political office as politicians, then say, I'm not a politician. What else are they? Politicians. They may not be good ones, but they're all politicians. I am a politician, I'm a practical politician. I look at reality, and that's what I deal with. My colleagues don't care about these young women. If they did, they wouldn't be for so much legislation that impacts negatively on all females. So that doesn't sway me at all. The one letter he gave us was not from a parent who has a child in school. It comes from somebody who doesn't even understand what it is we're talking about. But whenever Senator Foley's name is connected to a piece of legislation, he is such a one-idea person, in their mind, that they conclude it can only be about one thing. So that's what they write to him about, if this is a letter from
