pertaining to those who have little or no representation on this floor, I will fight for those issues because the people affected are real to me. I had said earlier that false information can even lead to war. Instead of hiring these so-called experts on CNN and CNBC and Fox and the rest of them, they ought to hire me. All these so-called experts do is watch the latest newscasts, read the New York Times, the Washington Post, then will get a very serious look on his face and then regurgitate what he read from the newspaper and it's as though he is speaking authoritatively. You know why I'm more correct than other people in this country? Because I can see the reality, look at it objectively and tell it like it is. Others belong to "Repelican" parties. Others belong to Democrat parties. Others are afraid to seem unpatriotic so they lie or, if they don't lie, they deliberately keep themselves ignorant. And if they're not ignorant, they are fearful and will not speak the truth that is out there.
