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would only lend confusion. If this amendment is adopted, it's not going to change the law as far as its meaning. If it's not adopted, the law will continue as it is and people will continue having a nongrammatical piece of legislation on the books. I withdrew it last time I offered it and a senator asked me why because he was going to vote for it,...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and that senator happens not to be here today when I brought it back. Nevertheless, I'm going to take a vote and I think Senator Schimek ought to vote with me, although she probably won't. I still will support every effort she puts forth and I will add to that effort to try to see that the young women that we both are concerned about will have access to needed information. Why do we want to keep them ignorant, Senator Byars? You don't have to answer that. There are members on this floor who, on other issues, behave in a way inconsistent with what they're doing on this bill. I know there is fear.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Already. That's what Methuselah said. He was 600 and lived 969 years and when time came to die he said, already. I will ask for a call of the house, Mr. President.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. A request for a call of the house. All in favor vote aye; opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 20 ayes, 2 nays to place the house under call, Mr. President.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: We are...the house is under call. All senators return to their desks. The house is under call. Senator Engel, Senator Jensen, Senator Janssen, Senator Quandahl, Senator Landis, Senator Jones, Senator Redfield, Senator Synowiecki, Senator Bourne. Senator Engel, would you check in? Senator Jones. We're all...we are checked in. Now proceed to vote on FA1440 by Senator Chambers. All in favor
