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doing it more deliberately and better. And the idea here is that you...first you get the permission, and then you do the details. And that could be another knock-down, drag-out fight. I don't disagree with that at all. It will be one of those things that has to be talked about. And it's not ever going to go away. I agree with that. Probably whatever we do, Senator Janssen, it will probably never go away. But in some fashion or another, we're still going to be dealing with gambling. I do think that if something passes on the ballot this year,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...then a lot of that pent-up need to get something on the ballot is going to go away. I don't expect that if you had an amendment that said we would allow up to five casinos or eight casinos that you're going to have anybody coming back in the near future, or even maybe the far future, asking for more, because I think it will take this Legislature a long time to approve up to eight. I think it will take it a good long time to do so. So Senator Smith, I don't have any problem with your amendment. But on the other hand, if you don't want to vote for the bill, then I'm not sure we should do it. We can do it, actually, next year, if it passes this year. We could make that one of the requirements for establishing a casino anywhere. It doesn't...it's one of those details that probably doesn't need to be in here but...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...probably should be addressed at some point.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Smith, on your amendment.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I in good faith offered this amendment. Am I...have I filed ten amendments for General File and ten amendments...ten Smith amendments for Select File, similar to LB 762, but don't have my name on it? Senator Beutler is the one who just last week perhaps put up a more traditional delay, if that be the case. But I wanted to visit the issue of local voter approval, and
